Florida Public Sector OSH Coverage Bill Passes First Committee Unanimously

At the 11th hour, after the Florida House said it was not hearing any new bills, ASSE's lobbyist in Florida was able to get HB 1029, ASSE's bill to provide OSH coverage to public sector employees in Florida, heard in the House Government Affairs Policy Committee. ASSE member Mark Friend, of Embry Riddle Aeronautical University and member of the Florida Task Force on Workplace Safety, went up to Tallahassee to testify at the hearing on March 25. The bill passed unanimously, by a vote of 7-0. ASSE members stepped up to write the members of this committee to urge them to support HB 1029. Getting this legislation into law will still be a tough fight, but this victory was a great beginning. Our efforts continue in the House and the Senate. ASSE Testimony Raises Concerns Over NIOSH Asbestos Roadmap Changes

ASSE voiced several concerns regarding the focus of the NIOSH Roadmap on Asbestos and other Elongated Particle Minerals at a NIOSH hearing held on March 30, 2009. Adele L. Abrams, Esq., CMSP, Professional member of the Mining and Construction Practice Specialty and co-chair of the NIOSH Mining Sector Council for its National Occupational Research agenda, submitted testimony on behalf of ASSE and expressed that that the revised NIOSH Roadmap has diverted from its ultimate goal in the original draft of developing a unified theory of thoracic-sized fiber toxicity between currently-known and newly identified mineral fibers, synthetic vitreous fibers, and nanofibers. The revised roadmap, Abrams said, downplays the importance of developing a unified theory when in fact, NIOSH representatives stated during a public meeting that the February 2007 Roadmap held the unified theory as the "ultimate goal" of its research. The testimony reflects comments submitted by ASSE in September of 2008 to NIOSH for the record.

ASSE Says OSHA Failed to Recognize Leading Standards at Crane Hearing

ASSE expressed a variety of concerns centered on the failure of the OSHA proposed rule Cranes and Derricks in Construction to reference leading national voluntary consensus standards on crane safety in testimony given by ASSE Professional Member Matt Burkart, a crane safety expert from Southampton, PA, a member of the A10 Safety Requirements for Construction and Demolition Operations Standards standard committee and chair of the ASCE Construction Site Safety Committee, at an OSHA public hearing. The testimony reflected comments ASSE submitted in January to OSHA for the record, where ASSE requested a hearing to address concerns that OSHA failed to reference the widely accepted A10 and other national voluntary consensus standards addressing crane and derrick safety. ASSE did support OSHA's general approach to ensuring that crane operators are qualified or certified to operate the equipment covered here but urged that certifications be accredited by the same nationally recognized accrediting agencies that accredit organizations certifying the professional competence of safety and health professionals. OSHA was urged to look closely at the negotiated rulemaking process used to develop the rule to see if lessons can be learned to help improve the negotiated rulemaking process as a way to engage the safety and health community in rulemaking. ASSE in Oregon Backs Employer Right to Set Safety Rules on Marijuana

On behalf of its members in Oregon, ASSE sent a letter to a key Oregon House Committee expressing support for occupational safety and health provisions of bills before the committee to protect an employer's right to determine safety rules concerning the use of marijuana. The issue is a concern of safety and health professionals due to the legal medical use of marijuana allowed in Oregon. HB 2497(pdf) and HB 3502 (pdf) would clarify that Oregon law does not require an employer to accommodate the medical use of marijuana in any workplace, to allow its possession or consumption, to allow an impaired person in the workplace, to restrict efforts to have a drug-free workforce. Barab Named Acting and Deputy Assistant Secretary for OSHA

U.S. Labor Secretary Hilda Solis today named House Education and Labor Committee senior policy advisor Jordan Barab as deputy assistant secretary for the Occupational Safety and Health Administration. Barab will also serve as acting assistant secretary for OSHA beginning Monday. Barab has worked for the committee for more than two years specializing in worker health and safety issues.

Prior to joining the committee, Barab worked for four years at the U.S. Chemical Safety and Hazard Investigation Board. He served as special assistant to the assistant director of Labor for OSHA from 1998 to 2001, and directed the safety and health program for the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees from 1982 to 1998. A native of Palos Verdes Estates, California, Barab is a 1975 graduate of Claremont McKenna College in California and received a Master's degree in International Relations from the Johns Hopkins University in 1978.

Diacetyl ANPRM Withdrawn

Secretary of Labor Hilda L. Solis today announced the withdrawal of an Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (ANPRM) for occupational exposure to food flavorings containing diacetyl.

The withdrawal will facilitate the Labor Department's Occupational Safety and Health Administration's (OSHA) timely development of a standard to protect workers from bronchiolitis obliterans, a serious and potentially fatal lung disease associated with such an exposure.

Withdrawing the ANPRM facilitates the convening of a small business advocacy review panel to determine the impact a proposed rule might have on small businesses and how those impacts can be reduced, consistent with the agency's statutory requirements. This panel process is required under the Small Business Regulatory Enforcement Fairness Act. All materials submitted prior to this withdrawal, as well as any other information submitted directly to OSHA after the withdrawal, will be put in the public rulemaking docket and will receive appropriate consideration as a part of the overall rulemaking record.

EPA Rulemaking to Require Greenhouse Gas Emissions Reporting

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency proposed the first comprehensive national system for reporting emissions of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases produced by major sources in the United States.

The new reporting requirements would apply to suppliers of fossil fuel and industrial chemicals, manufacturers of motor vehicles and engines, as well as large direct emitters of greenhouse gases with emissions equal to or greater than a threshold of 25,000 metric tons per year. This threshold is roughly equivalent to the annual greenhouse gas emissions from just over 4,500 passenger vehicles. The vast majority of small businesses would not be required to report their emissions because their emissions fall well below the threshold.

The direct emission sources covered under the reporting requirement would include energy intensive sectors such as cement production, iron and steel production, and electricity generation, among others.

The first annual report would be submitted to EPA in 2011 for the calendar year 2010, except for vehicle and engine manufacturers, which would begin reporting for model year 2011.

EPA estimates that the expected cost to comply with the reporting requirements to the private sector would be \$160 million for the first year. In subsequent years, the annualized costs for the private sector would be \$127 million.

EPA is developing this rule under the authority of the Clean Air Act. The proposed rule will be open for public comment for 60 days after publication in the Federal Register. OSHA Publishes Guidance on Selecting Respirators

Assigned Protection Factors (APF), a new guidance document published by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), provides employers with vital information for selecting respirators for employees exposed to

PHMSA Final Rule on Cargo Tank Motor Vehicle and Cylinder Issues

PHMSA is amending its Hazardous Materials Regulations to revise certain requirements applicable to the manufacture, maintenance, and use of DOT and MC specification cargo tank motor vehicles, DOT specification cylinders and UN pressure receptacles. The revisions are based on petitions for rulemaking submitted by the regulated community. The most significant amendment addresses a safety issue identified by the National Transportation Safety Board concerning the transportation of compressed gases in cylinders mounted on motor vehicles or in frames, commonly referred to as tube trailers. EPA NESHAP for Reciprocating Internal Combustion Engines

EPA is proposing national emission standards for hazardous air pollutants for existing stationary reciprocating internal combustion engines that either are located at area sources of hazardous air pollutant emissions or that have a site rating of less than or equal to 500 brake horsepower and are located at major sources of hazardous air pollutant emissions. In addition, EPA is proposing national emission standards for hazardous air pollutants for existing stationary compression ignition engines greater than 500 brake horsepower that are located at major sources, based on a new review of these engines following the first RICE NESHAP rulemaking in 2004. In addition, EPA is proposing to amend the previously promulgated regulations regarding operation of stationary reciprocating internal combustion engines during periods of startup, shutdown and malfunction. MSHA Wants Comments on Paperwork Requirements of Roof Bolt Standard

MSHA is seeking comments on the extension of the information collection related to the Safety Standards for Roof Bolts in Metal and Nonmetal Mines and Underground Coal Mines [(30 CFR Sections 56.3203(a), 57.3203(a), and 75.204(a)]. Pipeline Safety: Random Drug Testing Rate

The Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration (PHMSA) announced its minimum annual percentage rate for random drug testing. 2009 National Safe Boating Week Will Remind Boaters to ‘Wear It!’

Life jacket safety is theme of May 16-22 boating safety season kick-off

PITTSBURGH, PA – While boating is a safe and fun recreational activity enjoyed by thousands every year, in 2009 there may still be more than 600 boating fatalities nationwide from boating accidents. With this statistic in mind, the U. S. Coast Guard, Coast Guard Auxiliary, and other boating safety organizations are again encouraging boaters to “Wear It!” during National Safe Boating Week May 16-22. Wearing a life jacket can make the difference between life and death. According to the most-recently reported official U.S. Coast Guard statistics:

- 90 percent of drowning victims in recreational boating accidents were not wearing a life jacket in 2007.
- Drowning is the reported cause of death in two-thirds of all boating fatalities.

That’s why the U.S. Coast Guard and Auxiliary continue to push for increased and consistent life jacket wear on the water. There’s no reason not to wear one. The old-fashioned, bulky orange life jacket most people are used to has been replaced with innovative new options, including the new inflatable styles. Life jackets are available in a wide variety of compact, lightweight and attractive styles suitable for constant wear. Many are partially or wholly inflatable, and resemble a wide set of suspenders or even a belt pack. Special varieties are made for anglers, hunters, skiers and other sports enthusiasts. One newer style even has a built-in walkie-talkie.

Sharing the story of how life jackets save lives has the biggest impact when it comes from personal experience. The 2009 “Be a Survivor: Wear It!” contest calls on boaters to share their personal stories about boating accident survival where a life jacket saved the day. This year’s contest is sponsored by staff from West Marine®, a national boating-related products and services retailer. They are donating one grand prize shopping spree worth \$1,000 to this year’s winner. Entries will be accepted at www.SafeBoatingCampaign.com or by mail.
